



- There are many ways to do this:
 - Write a book or publish your Group Sheets
 - Distribute to family, friends, Linage societies, and libraries
 - Public Tree Sites
 - Requires uploading a GEDCom file, and sometimes your exhibits
 - Private Tree Sites
 - These are cross between the public tree sites and your own web site.
 For a monthly fee, you will have your own domain and tools to build a set of pages including a tree view.
 - Publish to your own web site
 - Requires Website software and your own host or use of a hosting service
 - Usually requires tree site builder software to upload your GEDCom to
 - Thes can be customized and are not dependent on the hosting company formatting




Publishing a Book or your Group Sheets

- There are classes both online and at CGS that cover this in detail, so I won't. Taking the CGS Write Now! Course is a good way to explore this option.
- Hard to update
- Many libraries no longer accept self-published books unless very relevant to their collection


Publishing to a Public Trees or a Private site

- These require the use of a GEDCom file unless you're using that public site's software or a web site's online software to host your tree
- Easy to update




• What is a GEDCom file?


 A GEDCom file is a test-based file that includes all the data in your tree – names, dates, events, relationships, sources, and anecdotes.




- Public Tree Sites
 - There are many of these and the options vary.
 - Most everything is done for you
 - You upload a GEDCom file and the site creates or adds the tree in a viewable tree form – it produces your tree on their web site – one step.
 - Some will handle your sources while others require you to use their sources or manually enter them.
 - Few allow exhibits, and even fewer allow exhibits for events.





- Public Tree Sites
 - You manage your tree at least initially. The site manages look and feel
 - Most of these allow you to have your tree marked as private. However, others can search it and see that you have entries.
 - Some such as Wikitree require you to mark each person in the tree private.
 - Some such as Family Search, Wikitree, and others – will allow others to make changes.
 - Some will allow both private and public trees.




- Public Tree Sites
 - ALL public sites own the data you place on them it's no longer yours. If your subscription ends, your privacy markings also end.
 - Privacy is enforced by most sites on living persons
 people with no death date and less than 125
 years old.
 - Read the site rules three times and make sure you are comfortable with them.
 - Most are free to upload but cost money to use.






- Private Tree Sites
 - A lot of the work is done for you
 - You manage your tree. Often you manage the look and feel
 - The provider manages your site domain registration, user rights, backups, etc.
 - Costs run from \$10 to \$50 a month, not including software. Software runs from free to one-time costs plus support fees - \$5 or so a month.
 - You get some of control over the look and feel
 - You own the data you place on them. If your subscription ends, your data is deleted.



- Publish to your own site
 - Software
 - Webtrees free
 - TNG software about \$40 plus annual fee
 - PhpGedView support quit in 2011, migrated to Webtrees
 - GedSite about \$25 plus periodic upgrades
 - Hosting Companys
 - IONOS
 - Family History Hosting



- Publish to your own site
 - More work up front. You manage your tree. Often you manage the look and feel
 - You must manage your site domain registration, user rights, backups, etc. You must also install the software you choose – including making sure required extras such as PHP are the correct versions.
 - You also must do periodic upgrades as versions of the O.S. or the web tree software change.
 - Costs run from \$10 to \$50 a month, not including software. Software runs from free to \$50 one-time costs plus support fees - \$5 or so a month.
 - You get a lot of control over the look and feel.
 - You own the data you place on them. If your subscription ends, your data is deleted.




